We delivered the USS TRUMAN 4 days early and under budget. A great effort by the entire project team and the ships crew to complete the availability ahead of schedule and under budget. We also delivered the USS ALASKA on time and within budget. The USS TENNESEE arrived in the yard to start its availability.

We supported emergent repairs on the USS SAN ANTONIO. The Commanding Officer of USS SAN ANTONIO, Commander Kurt Kastner, thanked the efforts of the NNSY team for correcting crucial piping system repairs throughout the ship's main propulsion diesel engine lube oil systems. Workers from NNSY and MARMC provided several weeks of onboard technical assistance and parts support in correcting crucial piping system repairs. The Secretary of the Navy, the Honorable Donald C. Winter, arrived on the ship November 25, 2008 to inspect the work completed on the lube oil piping system. Following his inspection he stated that, "I appreciate all you and your Norfolk [Naval] Shipyard counterparts have done to recover from this material issue and repair the ship, and I thank you for all your hard work," SecNav Winter told the USS SAN ANTONIO personnel. "You make me very proud".

VADM McCoy, RDML Hugel and Ms. Sharon Smoot visited the shipyard in February. During their visit they toured the ships on the waterfront and VADM McCoy addressed a large group of shipyard works. His message was about getting back to the basics and how all of our efforts are paying off. We hosted a luncheon for our guests in our lunch room and our President Glenn Edwards presented VADM McCoy and RDML Hugel with one of our national coins. They were both very appreciative and honored.

We selected Solomon Palmer as our Supt of the year. Solomon T. Palmer III, a Code 700 Division Head, had a huge surprise when he was announced as NNSY's 2008 Superintendent of the Year at our annual Christmas Party. Even this former Marine had a difficult time not shedding a tear in front of his colleagues while receiving such an honor from the place he had served for 36 years. This is the first time our chapter has awarded a Superintendent of the Year, making Palmer the first of hopefully many more to come. The award was created to honor the person who has shown his or her commitment to the shipyard and to their fellow workers, and has proven him or herself as a professional who sets an example for others. Solomon Palmer began his career at NNSY in November 1972 after serving four years in the U.S. Marine Corps, when he became a combat veteran of the Vietnam War. He started off as a Laborer, WG-03, and in less than two years was promoted to a Rigger Helper in the Intermediate training program. Over his next decade on the job, he was promoted a remarkable seven times within the rigging department. He went on to become the first Crane/Rigging Shop Resource Manager, the first Project Superintendent in the Operations Department, and was given the position of the Rigging Branch Manager in the Lifting and Handling Department until he received his current position as a Rigging and Equipment Operating Manager. It seems, Solomon Palmer has received just about every recognition and award possible here, proving himself as a true committed and hardworking player on the shipyard team. His co-workers have also commended him for being a man of integrity over the years. During his tenure, Solomon Palmer helped to reduce the number of crane accidents and assisted many of NNSY's critical operations along the waterfront. Solomon Palmer is a firm believer in the safety and security of his team. He is known as a forthright man who always speaks his mind and follows the rules. His

training in the Marine Corps prepared him for the life of management and he took those life lessons into account while working with his staff. Solomon Palmer said he's had the full support of his family since he first started at NNSY. He and his wife Rose have been married for 40 years, the same amount of time that he has been in military and civilian service. Solomon Palmer says that he would not be where he is today without the help of Rose.

Our workload for the first quarter of 2009 was busy from the start of the year, with the USS HOUSTON finishing her SRA, USS OLYMPIA finishing up on her crew certification leading to CA00 and the USS CHEYENNE completing SCOO and rapidly moving towards UDOO. We currently have three CNO ships in availability, completion of an ERO, starting a PIRA and a DMP, with FMAV work at its highest peak since 2007.

Our shipyard continues to move into a Learning Organization (LO) following the five disciplines of

Dr. Senge. Each availability is either utilizing a LO cell from a previous project or has created new LO cells to enhance team learning and behavioral changes. Currently, there are approximately (36) LO cells in progress. Many of them are being sponsored at the Shipyard/NAS command level. Our workshops and LO training continues with the vision that everyone will have attended the Talk workshops continuing with answering the following questions;

- What have we done differently as a result of the workshop
- What worked well
- What can be improved?

Our Superintendent Brother, Mr. Al Willing, retired after serving our country for over 37 years. His career started as an electronics helper, moving upward, ending his career as the Code 950 Shop Superintendent. He and his wife have already started traveling back and forth to San Francisco where their daughter and family have set up their home and careers. Al has dusted off his surfboard and can be seen at least three times a week, surfing with other retired shipyarders at Barbers Point Beach. Golf is still his passion, with many of the superintendents still seeing him frequently during club play.

RESOLUTION 2008-1

Submitted by Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard and IMF for the 92nd Annual Convention

CHAPTER: PEARL HARBOR NAVAL SHIPYARD & IMF

TITLE: PROPERLY RECRUIT, HIRE AND RETAIN PRODUCTION AND ENGINEERING RESOURCES AT ALL NAVAL SHIPYARDS TO MATCH THE CURRENT AND PROJECTED WORKLOAD

WHEREAS: All Naval Shipyards workforce level does not match the increases of current and projected work load.

WHEREAS: All Naval Shipyards demographics indicated a significant amount of attrition within the next three to five years.

WHEREAS: The Corporate strategy to move resources between shipyards, including the private shipyards resources, to accommodate the resource demand is not cost effective and does not meet all resource needs.

WHEREAS: The reduction of overtime budgets at all Naval Shipyards makes completing availabilities on schedule a challenge.

WHEREAS: The hiring and retention of valued Shipyard workers are a challenge due to increasing employment opportunities outside of the government.

THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

The National Association of Superintendents of U. S. Naval Shore Establishments strongly supports a continued and aggressive revitalization plan and is committed to develop a strategy to obtain separate funding that will be used specifically for recruitment, retention, and development programs for the workforce.
